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### **Minutes/Assignments:**

We started the meeting at 11:50. Ally, Shanni, and Ellie were not in attendance. Seth welcomed the new members on the council and brief introductions were given. Bret and Laura were re-elected, then Shanni Call and Alex Minson are two new members to the council.

Seth then started the meeting off with the thought. It was a thought he got from his 8-year-old daughter, Saige. They were playing catch one day and Seth said, "good Catch, Saige." She then replied; "Good throws lead to good catches." Seth related this to education and where responsibility and accountability lie. As educators we provide the "good throws" and do the work on our part necessary to provide that... In turn, our students are better equipped to make a "good catch." Our goal as a school and community is to help our students have the best opportunity to be successful.

Seth also conducted the SCC training. As a group we discussed the purpose and philosophy of SCC's then reviewed the handbook for required training. We reviewed to website and checked its compliance. There are links posted to the Agenda with video trainings as well.

Brittney Peay, an Admin Intern, then reviewed clubs and club rush. Club rush was held on the 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> of September. A list of clubs is found on the agenda above. We discussed the importance of clubs and helping students feel a sense of belonging. We also discussed the ins and outs of curricular vs. non-curricular clubs. There are new advertising rules and policies. Non-curricular clubs cannot be advertised or promoted within the school on flyers or on announcements. They are not to be affiliated with the school or its beliefs in any way. The school's role is simply to provide a space for students to congregate and have a teacher chaperone to facilitate the safe location.

Matt discussed the recent buzz around book reviews that is going around our district, state, and nation. There are groups of people concerned with library books and the content inside some of these books. People are showing up to Board Meetings and expressing their concerns. Some are showing up to schools and meeting with Principal's. The district is working on updating and enhancing our book review process. If people want a book reviewed or taken off of the shelves, there is a lengthy process that takes place. The book will go through a committee which consists of teachers, librarians, administrators, district office specialists, etc. that will each read the book and discuss it. After they have discussed the book, a decision is made by the committee about what will happen with the book.

Dawn then gave us the counseling update. Leslie Swenson joined us to discuss the PBIS Plan which stands for Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports. We are using the "Caught Livin' the Don Life" award program among other helpful things. Dawn discussed Utah College Application week that is coming up along with FASFA Night. She introduced Grace Culley who now works at our school as a College Access Advisor. Grace will be a great asset to our team.

The council voted on and elected a Chair and Co-Chair. Jami Branch was selected as Chair, and Josh Jensen was selected as Co-Chair. There were motions made, seconded, and all were in favor.

There is more teacher autonomy and more time to focus on what teachers feel is needed most. Example being more discussion time vs. more check-in time. We are seeing more buy-in with teachers, but still not grasping all of our students support.

Dawn then gave us our counseling update. She informed the council that they have been teaching in Josh's class about coping strategies. They are also preparing for college tours on November 8th. She also gave a report on UCAW and FAFSA Night. Both were a huge success and we had much to celebrate! We had more people participate than ever before and many students and their families were helped! They are planning on doing another FAFSA night in March to help even more families.

The meeting began at 11:50. Shanni Call was introduced in her first meeting as a new member. Alex, Shannon, Emily, and Ally were not in attendance.

Seth reviewed the previous minutes from October's meeting. Farris made a motion to approve the minutes, Dawn seconded the motion, all were in favor.

Kaylee shared a thought and advertisement for our upcoming Tree Fest Event at SFHS. Kaylee organizes this event and it's a wonderful thing for our school. Different clubs and organizations around our school and community donate and decorate Christmas trees and other décor items. They are displayed in our commons area and then an online silent auction is held to purchase trees or other items. All of the money raised goes to scholarships for SFHS students. What is great about these scholarships is that they typically go to students who may not qualify for any other scholarships but have post high school plans for schooling. We love this event and want it to grow every year! Trees will be set up by November 30<sup>th</sup> and on Display until December 10<sup>th</sup>. Bidding is open from December 7th-10th and closes at 8 PM on the 10<sup>th</sup>. There is a public viewing from 6-8 PM on the 10<sup>th</sup> as well.

Seth and Matt then reviewed our Term 1 successes and highlights. You can see data on the agenda above. The interesting note is that we had more honor roll students than ever, but also more F grades given. This is an interesting dynamic and we hope to diagnose why these trends are happening and make data-based decisions to better the education process at SFHS. Matt reported some new strategies we are implementing due to goals of our vision committee. We are doing our best to track attendance of our students, especially students involved with extracurriculars, but we want to add grade tracking to this as well. Our goal is to create higher accountability throughout the term with both attendance and grades. We are hoping this reduces stress and last-minute procrastination/obligations for both teachers and students.

The council then had a group discussion about a new hot topic that is going around. More and more people are feeling the need to show up to board meetings and schools to address concerns or ask questions. Sometimes these intentions are good and productive, and other times the intentions seem really negative and counterproductive. As a council we discussed what our norms and procedures should be in the event we have someone wanting to address our council. All school community council meetings are open to the public, but that does not mean they are open for public comment. As a council, we decided that we are fine with having anyone attend our meetings and be a listening spectator. If someone wants to address the council, they need to submit a proposal to the SCC facilitator for review. If approved by the council, we will allow the person to present information. During the proposal review, it will also be determined whether or not the council will engage in a conversation with the person. It will most likely not happen, rather be structured like board meeting where someone can address the board with no comments being returned. Seth is going to draft this procedure up for December's meeting. If/when approved by the council, he will add it to our Rules of Order and Procedure.

Dawn gave a counseling update. College tours have been a success and we had many students take advantage of these opportunities. We are approaching course selection time for students and we are constantly working to enhance this procedure. We have many charitable giving opportunities going on at our school this time of year and our counselors are working hard to provide for our families in need. We have the Warm the Soles program with Nebo Credit Union, the Hope Squad Giving Tree, Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners, SFHS food pantry, E4A Christmas meals, and of course Tree Fest. There are so many great people doing everything they can to help our students and community!

The meeting began at 11:50. Jami Branch and Shannon Bennett were not in attendance. Josh Jensen conducted the meeting and welcomed everyone.

Seth Spainhower reviewed the minutes from November's meeting. Dawn Draper made a motion to approve the minutes, Laura Olson seconded to motion, all were in favor.

Aly Dart then shared the message. She shared a thought from Adam Grey. Her overall message was about the possibility of people being wrong. Sometimes the fear of being wrong might make us insecure, or seem like we lack knowledge, but it's okay to be wrong and it's okay to listen!

Josh then led a group discussion about identifying our school's greatest needs and what plans we could make to improve. Some of the main points that were brought up were as follows: SFHS has amazing teachers who sincerely care about kids. Our goal is to have guaranteed and viable curriculum in every classroom, every day. We also have a new employee at our school, Grace Culley, who is here to help our students with their after high school plans. She specializes in college and career readiness. The group spent a great amount of time discussion the wants and drive for high school students today. It seems many of the youth today struggle with having intrinsic motivation. Too many young people settle for the bare minimum and look for the path of least resistance. It was also brought up that some students seem to be learning to game the system more than learning the content provided in class. Our parents want to help provide more consistency and high expectations both at school, and at home. Mental health struggles are also a growing concern. Some of this is still due to the covid aftermath, and some is just from the struggles of life and societal pressures. The group also discussed our new calendar and how the semesters are lined out. It was discussed how beneficial it would be to have all 3 secondary schools being aligned and more streamlined. This alignment should start with our middle school, then junior high, and our high school.

Seth Spainhower and Matt Christensen then went over our school safety plan and digital citizenship plans. Matt discussed our current practices, protocols, and procedures. This also includes our required practice drills, safety plan folders in each of our classrooms, and our campus security. SFHS has an on-campus resource officer, Kylie Packard, from SFPD here every day. We also have Brad Stone who is a retired police officer that works as a campus security supervisor at our school every day. We have also been researching other ways to enhance our security and school safety. The admin team has been meeting with a company who developed an app called Agex Aim. This app is customized to our school and offers cutting edge security and communication features. It is a platform where we can initiate school emergency drills or actual school emergency protocols in the event of an actual school crisis. This platform also provides means for instant communication to everyone on the faculty and provides a way for them to check in as safe or not. Law enforcement also has access to the platform and can be in the loop as well. We are very excited about getting this app at our school and providing an additional, and very effective, layer of school safety to SFHS.

Seth discussed digital citizenship practices and procedures that we have at SFHS. Because every student has their own school issued device, we spend a great amount of time and effort teaching digital citizenship. Our district computer use agreements, and filters help provide instruction and safety to our students. The district is constantly monitoring what is going on in our student google accounts and working very hard to keep our filters up-to-date. Character lessons about being safe with technology and using it wisely are taught in many of our classes and advisory periods.

Seth reviewed the SCC procedures for public attendance. As we group, the following was agreed upon. SCC meetings are open for anyone to attend, but public comments must be approved. These comments or questions should be brought to a member of the council before the meeting. The council will then decide the appropriate next step. This could include, but not limited to, allowing someone to address the council or just being invited to listen to the discussion about it.

Dawn Draper then gave the counseling update. They are busy helping students finish up the first semester and working extremely hard on getting second semester classes all squared away.

Matt Christensen then presented information about a book review request. We had parents from our community submit 3 library books for review. The three books can be found on the agenda above. As per district policy, these books will need to be reviewed by our school and district team to determine if they should remain in our library or not. Dreaming in Cuban has been off our shelves for over 20 years so we will not be reviewing that book. Alex Minson and Kristin Williams will be our certified employees on the book review team. Emily VanDyke volunteered to be a parent member and we will reach out to our PTA to fill the other two needed spots. Lorena Lesue will be our Librarian team member as well. Once the book has been read, a decision will be discussed and presented.
